HOUSING

IFSA-Butler arranges housing with a carefully selected host family, allowing you to explore everyday life in Mexico. The program fee includes three meals per day.

CLASSES

Introduction to Medical Spanish (3 U.S. credits) While this course will study the vocabulary used in the medical field, its emphasis is on applied Spanish language not only from a linguistic competence but also to learn how to interpret meanings of medical terminology according to the local cultural context. This is a theoretical course taught in Spanish and English and previous study of Spanish is not required.

Contemporary Issues in Public Health in the Yucatán (3 U.S. credits)

Increasing diversity in the socioeconomic, ethnic and racial composition of our communities presents health care providers with new challenges when responding effectively to patient healthcare. This course will expand on these topics, providing basic knowledge about healthcare in the Yucatán. Students will examine from a cross-cultural perspective the public and private health care systems of Mexico. This course is taught in English, and it includes a series of visits to local rural communities and medical facilities where students will conduct clinical observations.
